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
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Abstract

SENIOR NURSING STUDENTS' EXPERIENCE OF INTERPROFESSIONAL **EDUCATION AND COLLABORATION** 

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Background: Interprofessional education (IPE) needs to be introduced for health students as preliminary response for the successfulness of interprofessional collaboration (IPC) to develop an integrated and cohesive patient care of the client, family and community. Senior nursing students in bachelor level built interaction with physicians, pharmacists, dieticians, radiologists, and other health workers in clinical and community settings during their final stage before graduation. The study aimed to describe the variation of senior nursing students' experience of interprofessional education and collaboration. Methods: The study was a qualitative descriptive and used phenomenographic approach. Seven senior students who had finished all stages of their profession program participated as informant. Semi structured interview guide was used as tool to interview each student, and follow up questions were applied to stimulate informants improve and deepen their answers. Recorded statements were analyzed using latent qualitative content analysis. Results: There were four descriptive categories resulted in the study: 1) IPE is essential to be delivered during academic phase in nursing education; 2) IPE helps students interact and collaborate; 3) IPE requires structured schedule from school; 4) IPC enables student deliver holistic care. Discussion and Conclusion: During the profession program, senior nursing students need to have chance to interact with physician, pharmacists, dieticians and other health workers with the aim of improving their sense of collaboration and communication as their additional proficiencies in the real working area. The study found that senior nursing students expressed that IPE and IPC enabled them to deliver more comprehensive nursing treatment through collaboration and learning together with other health workers. However, some students sensed inadequacy interaction time with other partners from other disciplines. It is important to schedule arranged meeting for senior nursing students either with other students or senior health workers from different discipline.
